Top 10 places to visit in London



1. London Eye

Take a ride on the London Eye! It's the world's highest observation wheel which gives you a view of over 55 London's landmarks - just in 30 minutes.





2. Changing of the guard

3. British Museum

The famous British Museum exhibits the works of man from prehistoric to modern times from around the world. It's free!



4. Buckingham Palace

The London residence and administrative headquarters of the reigning monarch.



5. Natural History Museum

The museum is the home to a permanent dinosaur exhibition and boasts a collection of the biggest and the tallest animals in the world. See a life-sized Blue Whale, a 40-million-year-old spider and the Darwin Centre.



6. Tower of London and Tower Bridge

Officially **Her Majesty's Royal Palace and Fortress of the Tower of London**, it is a historic castle located on the north bank of the River Thames in central London. The adjacent Tower Bridge, with its two huge towers rising 61 meters above the River Thames, is one of London's best-known landmarks.



7. Big Ben and Parliament

Big Ben is the nickname for the Great Bell of the giant clock tower at the north end of the Palace of Westminster. The tower is officially known as Elizabeth Tower, renamed to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Elizabeth II in 2012; previously it was known simply as the Clock Tower. Below it, stretching along the Thames, are the Houses of Parliament, seat of Britain's government for many centuries.



8. Hyde Park

Covering 350 acres, Hyde Park is London's largest open space and has been a destination for sightseers since 1635. One of the park's highlights is the Serpentine, an 18th century man-made lake popular for boating and swimming



9. Trafalgar Square

Trafalgar Square was built to commemorate Lord Horatio Nelson's victory over the French and Spanish at Trafalgar in 1805. **Nelson's Column**, a 56-meter granite monument, overlooks the square's fountains and bronze reliefs, which were cast from French cannons.



10. Tate Modern



Tate Modern is a modern art gallery. It's Britain's national gallery of international modern art and forms part of the Tate group (together with Tate Britain, Tate Liverpool, Tate St Ives and Tate Online). Tate holds the national collection of British art from 1900 to the present day and international modern and contemporary art.
